2021 Highlights

- A \$100,000 gift from the St. Elizabeth Home Society supported a research initiative at Hamilton General Hospital called "Supporting Transitions in Care for Patients Following Heart Attack."
- At St. Peter's Hospital, The Foundation helped to fund Dr. Patricia Hewston's post-doctoral fellowship and made it possible for her to expand the GERAS DANCE program virtually.
- LCBO's holiday campaign raised a record \$1,300,245 in support of vital equipment purchases and life-altering programs at McMaster Children's Hospital.
- Clark Companies provided nearly \$300,000 to support the purchase of a CyberKnife at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre.

- The Lewis & Ruth Sherman Foundation and the TMX Group committed to supporting the Hospital 2 Home (H2H) program with \$90,000 in funding. H2H provides specialized care for patients who face social or economic barriers to achieving good health.
- Donor gifts of more than \$650,000 supported the purchase of critical equipment for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, including ventilators, incubators, cooling blankets and feeding pumps.
- During year two of the pandemic, The Foundation funded five massage chairs across Hamilton Health Sciences to help staff morale and well-being.
- At Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, \$348,000 in donor support funded the purchase of biotherapy lab software.

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Honouring Charles Juravinski

With the passing of 92-year-old Charles Juravinski on February 16, 2022, Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation lost a wonderful friend and champion for health care. Together with his wife Margaret, their generosity had a transformational impact on health care in Hamilton. Through their most recent gifts, which were dedicated to health care research, their impact will extend well beyond the region and ensure a lasting legacy.

With an overwhelming desire to inspire others, Charles often spoke about how donating made him feel: "When you donate, you absolutely feel better... and you walk away proud... You stand taller. I urge each and every one of you to support health care to the best of your abilities, no matter how great or modest."

Born in Saskatchewan in 1929, just as the Great Depression started, Charles had a challenging childhood as his family struggled to make ends meet. In 1942, his family relocated to Hamilton. Charles spent his early career working in construction and then he took a chance in 1973 when he launched the Flamboro Downs racetrack. Charles and Margaret managed the business for nearly 30 years until they sold it in 2002.

Shortly thereafter, Charles and Margaret began giving back in a transformational way. While they supported various causes, health care was closest to their hearts. Upon the announcement of their \$100-million legacy endowment in 2019, they penned a letter to the community. In part, it read: "We know that no matter one's age or station in life, that everyone who lacks good health is equally vulnerable. There is no worry that compares to being sick or disabled, and not knowing how things will turn out. We figured if we could help relieve... some of that worry for the families of our community, that we would be very pleased."

With each additional in-life gift, Charles and Margaret spoke about the "euphoria" that giving provided, and that they wanted their legacy "to be measured in the good health of those who come after us." Their generosity has been felt by thousands within this region, especially through care received at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre. Speaking with grateful patients always brought a wealth of emotion to Charles.

"Charles was a true friend to the community and his legacy of philanthropy will live on for years to come," says Pearl F. Veenema, Chief Executive Officer, Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation. "It was a privilege to know Charles. I admired his passion for life and for helping others. I was always humbled to see how much the gratitude expressed by patients and families meant to him."



Expanding Horizons at the Juravinski Research Institute

The Juravinski Research Institute continues to expand the horizons of health knowledge and standards of care with leading-edge clinical trials and research initiatives. The Institute was created through an extraordinary endowment of more than \$100 million by Charles and Margaret Juravinski.

Supporting a wide range of health research, the Institute is a special partnership between Hamilton Health Sciences, McMaster University and St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton.

Thanks to a \$3-million gift from Charles and Margaret in 2020, the Institute announced five projects in 2021 focused on the theme of health-system transformation. These projects are exploring innovative approaches to creating a more integrated and efficient health care system. Two of these projects are led by Hamilton Health Sciences investigators.

Dr. PJ Devereaux, Perioperative Care Physician and Cardiologist, and Michael McGillion, Innovations in Care Scientist, are lead investigators on a project called "Post-surgery virtual care with remote automated monitoring technology-2 (PVCRAM-2) trial." This randomized trial explores the effect of using virtual care with remote automated monitoring on surgical patients after their discharge.

Dr. Fadi Elias, a Hamilton Health Sciences vascular surgeon, is the lead investigator on a project called "Multidisciplinary virtual wound service for lower extremity wounds." This initiative is focused on developing a model of care that leverages virtual-care platforms to increase access for patients and minimize hospital visits.

With remarkable projects like these, the Juravinski Research Institute and the generosity of Charles and Margaret continue to impact patients throughout the region, across the country and around the world.

Remarkable Respiratory Care


When a patient experiences breathing difficulties, time is of the essence. That's why bronchoscopy is such an important procedure. A tiny camera and light on the end of a flexible tube are fed down the patient's nose or mouth, enabling the respirology team to see inside of the airway and lungs.

Funding from The Foundation has enabled enhancements to bronchoscopy services at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, which benefits both patients and staff.

"This funding has made it possible for us to have a fully equipped negative-pressure room with all the necessary equipment to manage the care of respirology patients," says Tracey Corner, Clinical Manager of Endoscopy and GI Investigations. "It has also provided us with new, state-of-the-art scope cabinets to ensure our delicate scopes are being handled and hung appropriately to avoid the need for repairs."

Having these specialized facilities has helped the respirology team reduce wait times for bronchoscopy to 12 hours or less.

"This has been particularly important for acute patients admitted with lung injury and respiratory failure due to infection/pneumonia or lung injury from cancer-related treatments or the cancer itself," says Dr. MyLinh Duong, Head of Respirology Service. "Funding from The Foundation has made a huge impact on the efficiency of our department and the timely care we're able to provide our patients."

Helping Kids be Kids

COVID-19 has impacted children in so many ways. This is especially true for patients at McMaster Children's Hospital, who have been affected by visitor restrictions and the cancellation of group activities that normally offer much-needed distraction, support and socialization.

The ongoing support of Golfi & Friends Fundraising included \$25,000 that enabled the purchase of four Gamers Outreach Systems for the Child Life Team. The systems, which include a Sony PlayStation console and pre-installed games, meet infection-control protocols and are designed to handle hospital-grade disinfecting.

"My husband John and I strongly believe in supporting children's play in the hospital, which allows kids to be kids," says Sabrina Melo of Golfi & Friends Fundraising and Golfi Concrete & Drain Ltd. "We're inspired to support the amazing work of the Child Life Team, who make such an impact on young patients' lives."

This is just the latest example of Golfi & Friends Fundraising's ongoing support of patient care at McMaster Children's Hospital. Over the past several years, it has held golf tournaments, fashion shows, dinners, auctions and many other community fundraisers.

"It's a wonderful feeling knowing that we can enhance the care of pediatric patients," says Sabrina. "We're grateful to see the positive outcome of our fundraising. Our inspiration to support McMaster Children's Hospital Foundation keeps growing stronger."

Special thanks as well to 407 ETR, which provided funds that enabled the purchase of two additional Gamers Outreach Systems. These donor gifts will help to make patients' stays at the Hospital that much brighter.

A Gift from the Heart for Cardiac Care

When a patient is admitted to the Emergency Department for cardiac care, having access to the right medical equipment at the right time can make all the difference in the world.

A generous gift from an anonymous donor is helping to ensure that such patients receive the best possible care during times of need. The \$100,000 donation was given by the family of a grateful patient as a way of giving back to the community.

"The gift to The Foundation was directed toward the purchase of important cardiac equipment for the Emergency Departments at Hamilton General Hospital and Juravinski Hospital," says Emergency Physician Dr. Paul Miller. "Two new ECG (electrocardiogram) machines were purchased, as well as ECG telemetry packs, which are often in need of replacement."

ECG machines are heavily used in the Emergency Departments to measure the electrical activity in the heart, and ECG telemetry packs are portable devices that continuously monitor cardiac activity and transmit that information to a central location.

"We are very grateful to the donor for their amazing support, which enabled the purchase of this vital equipment," says Dr. Miller. "Through this gift, they are recognizing the important role played by emergency services in the continuum of care for cardiac patients, and they are making a real difference in people's lives."

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Pediatric Cancer Care Gets an Upgrade

As of this writing, renovations to the Pediatric Oncology Clinic at McMaster Children's Hospital are nearing completion and the upgraded space is expected to open in the early spring of 2022.

The expanded clinic, which was funded through the generosity of donors, will feature distinct new areas to enhance the patient and family experience.

"I'm excited about the dedicated teen room, which will be a new space where teens can meet separately from the main clinic area," says Berta da Costa-Andre, Project Manager of Capital Development. "There will also be a new consultation area where team members can meet with patients and families privately when needed."

This expansion, which has been years in the making, was undertaken with valuable input from patients and families throughout the process.

"The goal is to have a more comfortable environment for patients, families and staff," says Krista Binnington, Clinical Manager of Pediatric Hematology/ Oncology. "Beyond aesthetics, the expanded space will optimize the footprint of the clinic and enhance the flow of care."

When the upgraded clinic opens its doors for the first time, patients and families will benefit from a larger, brighter and more ergonomic space that was designed with their needs in mind.

Dr. Carol Portwine shares her colleagues' excitement about the grand opening: "This is a wonderful opportunity to have our patients be treated in a fresh new space to call our own – a space that we can all be proud of."

A Breath of Relief with ECMO

COVID-19 made every single breath a struggle for some patients. Fortunately, teams at Hamilton Health Sciences were able to care for many such patients with ECMO (extracorporeal membrane oxygenation), which is an artificial heart-lung bypass machine.

"For people with respiratory failure, including those with COVID-19, ECMO can buy time to allow all the other therapies to work and the lungs to heal," says Dr. Andre Lamy, a cardiac surgeon at Hamilton General Hospital and Surgical Director of the ECMO Program.

The ECMO system pumps blood from the patient's body to an oxygenator, which adds oxygen and removes carbon dioxide before pumping it back into the patient.

Although not designed specifically for treating COVID-19 patients, ECMO proved successful in the care of patients like Mike VanNetten from Norfolk, who caught the virus in April 2021. The 45-year-old was hit hard by COVID-19 and he nearly lost his life when his lungs shut down.

Thanks to the care he received at Hamilton General Hospital, including the Regional Rehabilitation Centre, Mike recovered after spending nearly three months as an inpatient.

In 2021, donors made a significant impact on the care of COVID-19 patients by supporting *Strides For Health Care Heroes*. Proceeds from the fundraiser were used to purchase vital medical equipment, including a new ECMO.

"Thanks for making a difference for patients like me," says Mike. "I'm truly grateful for your support."

Paying it Forward: Helping Patients in Honour of Dr. Popović

The late Dr. Goran Popović gave so much to the Hamilton community over the years, having worked as a nurse at Henderson General Hospital, Hamilton General Hospital and McMaster Children's Hospital. Dr. Popović spent the latter half of his career sharing his passion for medicine through the education and training of future nurses and medical professionals.

After he passed away in 2019 from pancreatic cancer, the Popović family decided to fundraise in his honour and support Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre Foundation.

In 2021, the family generously donated more than \$13,000 to support the purchase of six Sleep-Eez chairs for the C3 Inpatient Unit, which can be extended to become a recliner or bed.

"The chair helps patients with their posture and sitting comfort, and it helps with lower-leg edema if they need to extend their legs," says Occupational Therapist Cindy McDonald. "For family members who spend long hours or stay overnight at the bedside, the chairs give them a comfortable option to rest or sleep so they can be with their loved ones."

Dr. Popović spent the latter part of his cancer journey on the C3 Inpatient Unit, and he appreciated how Sleep-Eez chairs aided in his comfort when needed most. The Popović family hopes that the six new chairs will provide other patients and families with a small measure of comfort on their own journeys with cancer.

"We're very grateful for their support," says Cindy. "It's wonderful that they're paying it forward to those who are dealing with difficult times like they were."

Into the Virtual Realm with Health Care

The pandemic continues to transform numerous aspects of our lives, including how patients access many services and resources at Hamilton Health Sciences.

"In providing virtual visits as an alternative option to in-person visits, we are ensuring that patients have access to care that is secure, safe and accessible," says Lucas Milinovich, Director of Urgent and Ambulatory Care.

In addition to decreasing the chances of viral spread, virtual care has numerous other advantages for patients.

"Different programs across Hamilton Health Sciences have created special online resources, such as informational videos, online classes and virtual group sessions," explains Virtual Care Specialist Julie Matthews.

Because distance doesn't matter with virtual care, it also saves time and money for patients.


"Virtual services benefit patients who have challenges with transportation, whether because of the distance involved or because of medical concerns," says Lucas.

Making a Difference at St. Peter's Hospital

Whether it's funding a major redevelopment project, like the renovation of the Restorative Care Gym, or the purchase of smaller pieces of equipment, such as vital signs monitors and ECG machines, donor support plays a vital role in the everyday care of patients at St. Peter's Hospital.

The site is a hub for inpatient, outpatient, and community-based programs for adults living with chronic and terminal illnesses. Four specialized inpatient programs operate out of the 235-bed Hospital, including Restorative Care, Medically Complex Care, Behavioural Health and Palliative Care.

each of which have benefitted greatly from Foundation support over the years.

"Financial gifts from donors are integral to our work and go beyond simply supporting our functional needs at the Hospital," says Leslie Gillies, Vice President of Community Medicine and Population Health at Hamilton Health Sciences. "Community support has also helped to fund a variety of innovative opportunities, like our Art Therapy and Music Therapy Programs, that greatly improve quality of life for our patients."



Excellence in Care for Today and Tomorrow

Working collaboratively, Foundation and Hospital staff identify and prioritize current needs and opportunities at the site. They also plan proactively for larger purchases and enhancements that will be needed in future years.

As a result of this strong relationship between Hospital leadership and The Foundation, fundraising has become deeply embedded in the culture at St. Peter's Hospital.

"It has translated and filtered down all the way to our frontline teams," says Leslie. "The staff here have become actively involved in fundraising initiatives, because they can see the impact of how that money is being used."

Restorative Care Program

The Restorative Care Program at St. Peter's Hospital provides treatment and rehabilitation therapy for patients who require additional hospital care following illness or injury.

In collaboration with patients and their families, the Restorative Care team helps patients establish defined recovery goals and designs customized plans to regain strength, mobility and independence. This program aims to help patients transition back to life in the community or onward to their next phase of care.

Medically Complex Care Program

The Medically Complex Care Program provides short-term inpatient care for adults with complex needs and functional challenges who require comprehensive interventions.

The program's expert team of clinicians specializes in preventative and clinical management of symptoms and conditions. They treat patients suffering from a wide range of conditions, such as stroke, aneurysms, Parkinson's disease, Multiple Sclerosis (MS) and Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS).

Care is focused on helping patients achieve their goals, whether that is returning home or transferring to another facility that will meet their ongoing needs.



The Behavioural Health Program at St. Peter's Hospital is a specialized service for adults who have a diagnosis of dementia and exhibit challenging behaviours that present a risk to themselves or others. The inpatient unit provides a safe and secure environment where patients can be assessed, treated and supported in their transition to an alternate level of care.

Team members use a person-centred approach and evidence-based interventions to reduce the intensity and frequency of behaviours, with the goal of preserving function and facilitating a successful discharge back to a community setting.

This supportive model of care emphasizes the preservation of personhood and dignity, understanding the patient's goals of care, and the use of Gentle Persuasive Approaches (GPA).

Palliative Care Program

St. Peter's Hospital is home to Canada's largest adult inpatient Palliative Care Program. Palliative Care focuses on maintaining the quality of life, comfort, autonomy and dignity of patients with life-limiting illness.

While most commonly associated with end of life, palliative care can be provided during all phases of illness, even as early as diagnosis. Recognizing that people approach death from their own unique perspectives, the team provides care that respects each individual's values, spiritual beliefs, cultural roots, family dynamics and life experiences.

Brightening Days for Blood-Cancer Patients

At Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, the team at the Ron and Nancy Clark Stem Cell Transplantation and Cellular Therapies Unit provides critical care for patients with blood cancers every day.

In 2021, the support of generous donors made it possible for The Foundation to purchase patient amenities and equipment for the unit.

A gift of more than \$14,000 from Liam's Legacy Golf Tournament enabled the purchase of electronics, such as iPads and video-game consoles, as well as a snack cart to help brighten the days of patients. Liam's Legacy Golf Tournament was created in honour of the late Liam Comyn from Paisley, who received care at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre for lymphoma and passed away in 2019.

A gift of more than \$10,000 from the LeBrun family also supported the purchase of electronics for patients, which

was especially welcome during the socially isolating days of the pandemic. The family made the donation in memory of Chris LeBrun from Bedford, who passed away in 2015 after a journey with leukemia.

The family of Mike Flaherty, who underwent a stem cell transplant at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre in 2018 as part of his treatment for non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, donated \$13,000 to support the purchase of Sara Stedy lifts. These devices help patients reach a standing position from a wheelchair or bed.

Mike went on to be a Patient Ambassador for 2021's *Illuminight* and we are grateful for all the fundraising he did along with his family and friends.

The generosity of donors like these goes a long way in enhancing patient care, and we are extremely grateful for their support.

Integrated Stem Cell Journey

To further support care in the clinic, The Foundation provided \$348,000 to support the purchase of a WellSky Biotherapies Clinic software module. This provides the health care team with a comprehensive view of the patient's entire transplant process in one database, which streamlines clinical workflow and the management of patients.

"The module is an important tool that helps connect the clinical and the laboratory aspects of a stem cell transplant," says Dr. Kylie Lepic, Medical Director of the Cellular Therapy and Transplant Program. "This new technology helps us to continue providing the best care for our transplant patients from the lab to the bedside."

Ryan Martz was born with a congenital disorder called Agenesis of the Corpus Callosum, meaning that the hemispheres of his brain couldn't communicate with each other. But that didn't stop this extraordinary boy from lighting up the world and inspiring those around him.

"His condition resulted in a number of developmental delays," explains Ryan's mother, Arlene DeGroot. "He found appointments distressing because he was out of his element. Ryan loved lights and other sensory experiences, which calmed him down and helped to make the appointments go more smoothly."

After Ryan passed away in 2016 at the age of seven, Arlene and her husband Cliff Martz founded Ryan's Rays, a charitable foundation inspired by their late son.


To help other children in need, Ryan's Rays funded the purchase of two Snoezelen carts for Ron Joyce Children's Health Centre. The carts provide various lighting effects, sounds and tactile accessories to help agitated patients relax and focus.

"We're extremely grateful for this generous donation," says Dr. Caroline Roncadin, Clinical Director of the Autism Spectrum Disorder Program. "We also appreciate the portability and flexibility of these carts, which we can bring to sessions throughout the building for children with various diagnoses, medical conditions and challenging behaviours."

As Hamilton Health Sciences' Vice President, Oncology and Palliative Care and Regional Vice President for Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario/CCO), Dr. Meyer played a pivotal role in ensuring health care excellence for patients across south-central Ontario.

Since joining Hamilton Health Sciences and Cancer Care Ontario in 2013, Dr. Meyer led the development and expansion of several patient-care areas at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre. This includes the CIBC Breast Assessment Centre; the Ron and Nancy Clark Stem Cell Transplantation and Cellular Therapies Unit; the Rapid Evaluation and Symptom Support Cancer Unit (RESSCU); and the Psychosocial Oncology Supportive Care Program.

Dr. Meyer established executive leadership councils at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre to facilitate a team approach to problem-solving and decision-making. He was also instrumental in advancing the first Patient and Family Advisory Committee at the site.

In retirement, Dr. Meyer plans to remain active in support of medical research across Canada. He will also continue supporting the next generation of oncology leaders as a Professor with the Department of Oncology at McMaster University.

"Dr. Meyer has worked tirelessly to enhance the care of patients throughout the region," says Pearl F. Veenema, Chief Executive Officer of Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation. "We are grateful for his unwavering support of The Foundation and we wish him the very best in his retirement."

The Remarkable Legacy of Dr. Peter B. Dent

We honour the late Dr. Peter B. Dent, who passed away on September 23, 2021 at the age of 85 after a lifetime of leadership in pediatric health care.

Dr. Dent joined McMaster University's medical school in 1967 as a researcher, and he was a pioneer for creating Canada's first multidisciplinary program in immunology and virology.

As the Chair of McMaster's Department of Pediatrics from 1980 to 1990, Dr. Dent founded what is now known as McMaster Children's Hospital.

He held several senior hospital positions, serving as Vice-President (Medicine) for Chedoke-McMaster Hospitals and Director of Research for Hamilton Health Sciences from 1990 to 1997.

Dr. Dent was the Associate Dean, Clinical Services for the Faculty of Health Sciences from 2002 to 2012. In 2015, he retired as Head of Pediatric Rheumatology at McMaster Children's Hospital. In 2017, Dr. Dent was named to the Order of Canada – the highest civilian honour.

The Peter Boris Dent Memorial Funds were created by McMaster University and Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation in his honour. They include the Dr. Peter B. Dent Memorial Resident Scholarship in Pediatrics, the Peter B. Dent Memorial Lecture and the Peter B. Dent Memorial Research Impact Fund.

New Chair in Autism Charts the Course

The first-ever virtual Teddy Bear Hospital, sponsored by Marz Homes, was one of *Walk & Wheel*'s major highlights. More than 150 MacKids picked up Teddy Bear Kits, which included fun and educational activities that encouraged kids to provide hands-on medical care for their teddy-bear friends.

Due to the overwhelming generosity of *Walk & Wheel* supporters, the original fundraising goal was surpassed twice over and more than \$205,000 was raised to fund the purchase of FEES (Fiber-optic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing) equipment, a POCUS (Point-of-Care Ultrasound System) and a uroflow machine.



Taking Strides For Health Care Heroes During COVID-19

In 2021, *Strides For The General* was temporarily re-named *Strides For Health Care Heroes* to show support for the amazing medical professionals at Hamilton General Hospital, including the Regional Rehabilitation Centre, and St. Peter's Hospital.

Participants could choose to walk or run their own, personalized route over the course of 10 days, and they raised more than \$130,000 in support of equipment purchases. Generous donors from the community matched every dollar raised with an additional \$3.

Proceeds from *Strides* enabled the purchase of an ECMO life-support machine for Hamilton General Hospital and a Spirit bed for St. Peter's Hospital, which is specially designed to prevent vulnerable patients from falling.



Illuminight - Walking to Shine a Light on Cancer

It was inspiring to see the community embrace the re-imagined, virtual *Illuminight* in support of Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre Foundation. The virtual kick-off highlighted the incredible teams and participants that rallied their friends, families, and networks to donate and help reach the \$100,000 fundraising goal.

Proceeds from 2021's *Illuminight* enabled the purchase of a state-of-the-art 3D array detector, which will ensure an even greater level of accuracy in measuring radiation dose during quality checks.

Many patients refer to their cancer experience as a journey. For Penny MacCormack of Simcoe, it's been a triathlon.

In May 2019, she started having sharp cramps. When the pain kept getting worse, Penny was rushed to the local emergency department, where testing revealed a mass on her colon. She had metastatic colon cancer.

After surgery at her local hospital to remove the mass, Penny was referred to Juravinski Cancer Centre for chemotherapy.

"The staff are knowledgeable, kind and compassionate," she says. "They're like a second family to me."

As her 50th birthday approached in May 2021, Penny was also approaching the two-year mark of her treatment. The cancer had spread from her colon, but the growths in her body had either shrunk or remained stable.

To celebrate, Penny participated in her Triathlon for a Cure on May 29, 2021. She kayaked on the Waterford Ponds, biked from Waterford to Simcoe and walked/jogged from Simcoe to Port Dover. She exceeded her original \$5,000 goal, raising more than \$20,000 for Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre Foundation.

Investing in the Future of Youth

Youth are in crisis today as we've never seen before, with many experiencing COVID-related isolation and other impacts affecting their mental health. Many of these youth are presenting to the Emergency Department at McMaster Children's Hospital with suicidal thoughts and self-harm behaviours.

The Rapid Access Clinic (RAC) was implemented in February 2021 to address the need for urgent connection to mental-health supports.

A generous gift of \$300,000 from RBC over a three-year timeframe is vital to the team's ability to provide timely assessments, enhance patient care and implement risk-management interventions.

The RAC team includes a social worker, a nurse practitioner and access to psychiatry. The gift investment enables an additional, dedicated and experienced social worker to support the volumes and acuity of the youth presenting to this service.

The social worker is responsible for risk assessments, short-term psychotherapy and service coordination. This includes important collaborations with various partners, including schools, social services, child-protection services and other mental-health organizations.

UNPLUGGED

AN UNFORGETTABLE VIRTUAL CONCERT EXPERIENCE

On March 7, 2021, our remarkable donor community once again demonstrated its support for Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation's annual Gala.

The Gala celebration, called UNPLUGGED, was held virtually to help ensure everyone's safety as the pandemic continued. Proceeds from the Gala supported research initiatives at Hamilton Health Sciences that aim to expand the horizons of medical knowledge and ultimately improve patient care.

Among the supported projects was "Supporting children and youth awaiting treatment for an eating disorder," an important initiative led by psychiatrist Dr. Jennifer Couturier.

The pandemic has increased wait times for young patients who require treatment for eating disorders. This study aims to determine the effectiveness of an intervention, which involves educating parents about renourishing their children and interrupting disordered eating behaviours. Progress is on track and 30 participants have been enrolled in the program.

Another initiative supported by the Gala was "Non-Invasive Ventilation Helmets: Assessing the efficacy and safety in critically ill patients with respiratory failure." Under the leadership of intensivist Dr. Bram Rochwerg, the project is investigating the effectiveness of a new oxygen helmet in treating patients with respiratory failure.

Progress is going well and 20 patients have been enrolled in the project to evaluate the helmet's comfort and efficacy, as well as potential complications with the helmet's use. A randomized trial is also being planned that will compare the helmet to the more traditional method of providing non-invasive ventilation with a facemask.

Thank you to our donors for helping researchers at Hamilton Health Sciences enhance patient care today and into the future.

Caring for the Children of Cancer Patients

Up to 24 per cent of adult oncology patients have children under the age of 18, many of whom experience emotional challenges, difficulty sleeping, depression and post-traumatic stress as a result of their parent's cancer.

A research study supported by Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation investigated the feasibility of creating a new Child Life Specialist (CLS) program at Juravinski Cancer Centre to support the children of these patients. Numerous interviews were conducted with adult oncology patients, family members and children of cancer patients to better understand their perspectives and needs.

Heather McKean, a CLS at McMaster Children's Hospital, was instrumental in advancing the project and bringing it to fruition. The initative resulted in the creation of a new CLS position at Juravinski Cancer Centre, with Bridget Veltri taking on the position in early 2021. Her focus is helping children and youth understand their parent's diagnosis and how it affects their family.

Services may include: providing developmentally appropriate explanations for a new diagnosis or changes in medical status; clarifying misconceptions; support with end of life; grief and bereavement; and maximizing the parent-child relationship via emotional expression and parenting support.

Thanks to donor support of the research study, the CLS program became a reality and is making a real difference in the lives of children and youth during times of need.

Strengthening Transitions in Care for Heart-Attack Patients

A \$100,000 gift from the St. Elizabeth Home Society supported an exciting initiative at Hamilton Health Sciences called "Supporting Transitions in Care for Patients Following Heart Attack."

This project addresses the needs of heart-attack patients, who often require health care services that are provided by a range of different service providers in different locations. Effective transitions between these services are essential to an effective recovery.

Unfortunately, some patients fall through the cracks and do not access the necessary services along the way. This can lead to a slower recovery, the use of services that aren't actually needed, and increased costs to patients and the health care system.

Under the leadership of Dr. JD Schwalm, the Cardiology Site Lead at Hamilton General Hospital and Director of the Centre for Evidence-Based Implementation, the project aims to identify challenges faced by this patient population and improve their outcomes.

Thank you to the St. Elizabeth Home Society for supporting this initiative, which will have a major impact on the care and recovery of heart-attack patients from across the region.

Dancing Virtually for Cognition and Exercise

Time to get the blood pumping! GERAS DANCE is a therapeutic mind-body program for older adults developed at the GERAS Centre for Aging Research, which is located at St. Peter's Hospital.

Dr. Patricia Hewston is the co-creator and scientific-curriculum lead of the program, which involves dance classes to improve brain health and mobility for adults age 60 and above. In-person classes were held in community centres prior to the pandemic, but this was no longer possible with COVID-19.

"I'm grateful to Hamilton Health Sciences Foundation, which helped fund my post-doctoral fellowship and made it possible for me to expand GERAS DANCE into the virtual realm," explains Dr. Hewston. "This way, patients can still participate at home."

In 2021, Foundation funding enabled her to apply for additional funding from other sources, which further supports her work at St. Peter's Hospital.

"It is so important for health care innovation to support the next generation of clinical scholars to lead advancements in applied health research," says Dr. Alexandra Papaioannou, Executive Director of the GERAS Centre for Aging Research. "Dr. Hewston has been a wonderful mentor to undergraduate students who have chosen a career in health care as a result of the research being done."


